## Church Lane to close for resurfacing work



A section of Church Lane, from its junction with the A36 to its junction with Crowe Lane, will be closed temporarily to all traffic between 7am and 6pm from Monday, June 5 to Friday, June 16.

Planned works include carriageway resurfacing, replacement of road markings, adjustments of ironworks and other associated works. Alternative route via New Road, Dark Lane, Freshford Lane, Park Corner, Abbey Lane and A36.

## **Nick Stevens**

It was with great sadness that we heard the news of the death of Nick Stevens on May 7.

Nick served on Freshford Parish Council for 14 years, many of them as chairman.

For several years he also chaired the Friends of Freshford and Village Hall committee.

One of Nick's many notable achievements - together with his opposite number in Limpley Stoke - was in bringing about, in 2015, a joint Neighbourhood Plan for the two villages, the first cross-county plan in the country. He was also instrumental in bringing The Tyning into community ownership.

## **New constituency seat for local MP?**

Michelle Donelan is to fight the new parliamentary constituency of Melksham and Devizes for the Conservative Party at the next General Election.

The new seat, which will have a prospective electorate of 71,823, has been created under a Boundary Commission Review, after Ms Donelan's current Chippenham constituency was subjected to a 50:50 split. The review will be finalised by July 1 and the constituency will include Bradford on Avon, Devizes, Melksham, and Winsley and Westwood (which takes in Limpley Stoke).



Ms Donelan, who is currently on maternity leave from her role as Secretary of State for Science, Innovation and Technology after recently welcoming a baby boy, told the *Wiltshire Times*: "Under the Boundary Commission Review, there have been some quite radical changes in Wiltshire to accommodate a new MP. It is all based on making their numbers even. We had constituencies where there were massive numbers of electors.

"It has been a very difficult choice between the two because it has been a 50:50 split and these are the areas that I have represented for over eight years now. But I also live in this constituency of Melksham and Devizes and it felt like the right decision for me", she added.

## Funding cut puts 94 bus under threat

Councillor Johnny Kidney has expressed his concern that the future of the No. 94 bus service into Bath from the villages has

been thrown into uncertainty by the unexpected withdrawal of funding.

The 94 is a heavily-subsidised, cross-border service covering rural communities in Wiltshire and Bath and North East Somerset (B&NES) and currently funded by Wiltshire Council and the West of England Combined Authority (WECA). WECA receives funds



from three local authorities (B&NES, Bristol and South Gloucestershire) and central government to provide transport services.

From July, there appears to be no funding from WECA for the 94 service and funds from Wiltshire Council would be insufficient to run the service as it operates currently.

### **£50k traffic scheme** for Bradford on Avon

Work aimed at ridding Bradford on Avon of some of its long-standing traffic issues has begun. Wiltshire Council and the town council are working on a £50,000 modelling scheme with highways consultants Atkins which should take around six months to complete.

The objectives of the scheme are for increased pedestrian and cyclist safety, reduced traffic volumes and improved air quality.

The results of the project will be shared with the community at a future consultation event.

#### Bus fare cap extended

The £2 single bus fare promotion has been extended to the end of October, with the cap then remaining at £2.50 until November 2024. First Bus and Libra Travel are included in the promotion, should the latter still be operating by then, that is.
